The museum: a Laboratory for Empathy

Museums and general practice share a common mission: to learn to see people in all their vulnerability in order to cure them better.

Museums and general medicine share a profound mission: to learn to observe and listen to human beings in all their vulnerability in order to care for them more effectively. Through its works, the museum establishes itself as a laboratory of the gaze—observing a Greek statue or a Géricault trains the eye just as a medical history shapes the act of listening. It also invites us to consider the body’s autonomy as a subject, whether depicted in its rebellion (Delacroix), its pain (Kahlo), or its inner anguish (Munch). Finally, the museum possesses a genuine power of healing: Monet’s Water Lilies or kintsugi remind us that a crack can become a work of art. Like the general practitioner, it protects, repairs, and cares—a logic of care that explains why some countries now prescribe actual museum prescriptions.

New recommendations on the management of patients at cardiovascular risk in primary care

Cardiovascular prevention is a central part of everyday primary care, but it raises very practical questions: how should cardiovascular risk be assessed, how should prevention strategies be chosen, and how can decisions remain truly patient-centred?

This round table takes place as the new French recommendations on cardiovascular risk management in primary care are about to be published, following the release of the HAS scoping note. It will bring together Prof. Rémy Bousageon and Prof. Clarisse Diabao, both general practitioners, professors of general practice, and members of the HAS working group for these recommendations, alongside Emmanuel Nouyrigat, project officer at the French National Authority for Health. The discussion will focus on cardiovascular risk assessment, pharmacological and non-pharmacological prevention strategies, and their implementation in daily practice. Particular attention will be given to patient-centred care and shared decision-making, combining scientific evidence, clinical judgement, patient preferences and feasibility in primary care. A key feature of these recommendations is the use of the GRADE approach, supporting recommendations based on the best available evidence, with a transparent assessment of benefits, harms and certainty of evidence.

The aim is to provide clear and practical guidance for general practitioners, helping them translate forthcoming evidence-based recommendations into cardiovascular prevention that is both rigorous and adapted to real-life primary care.

In ageing individuals, changes in bodily functions and the body's transformation process begin. With ageing, a physiological decrease in food intake occurs. In addition to all this, the presence and severity of comorbidities also increase morbidity and mortality. Nutrition plays an important role in the health status of older individuals. Launch of the Lancet Gastroenterology & Hepatology Commission on the role of primary care in the response to the global liver disease syndemic

Liver disease causes substantial global morbidity and mortality, with a growing burden from steatotic liver disease, driven by alcohol use and metabolic dysfunction, alongside persisting challenges from chronic viral hepatitis. Liver disease frequently coexists with multimorbidity (including diabetes, cancer, and mental illness), with bidirectional relationships that demand integrated, person-centred pathways of care. Primary care is uniquely positioned to deliver population-level prevention, early detection, and management of liver disease while reducing health disparities. Launching in this session, the Lancet Gastroenterology & Hepatology Commission on the role of primary care in the management of liver disease brings together multidisciplinary global expertise to provide recommendations to strengthen primary care-led management of individuals living with chronic liver disease, and to place it at the centre of efforts to tackle the growing global burden of liver disease.

Every contact counts: identifying addictive behaviors earlier in primary care

Addictive behaviors are rarely disclosed as such during consultations. They often emerge in seemingly ordinary situations: persistent lower back pain, prolonged sick leave, sleep disturbances, prescription renewals, repeated prescription refills, requests for medical certificates, family concerns, or preventative care appointments.

How can we identify these early warning signs? How can we ask an initial question without judgment? How can we initiate a discussion without damaging the relationship? And above all, how can we avoid feeling isolated when the patient's response calls for further intervention? This session is designed for general practitioners and, more broadly, for primary care professionals who wish to enhance their early detection skills through a realistic, coordinated approach that can be applied to daily practice.

Skin lesions are among the most common reasons for consultation in primary care. With the global rise of melanoma and non-melanoma skin cancers, early detection is essential for improving outcomes. Dermoscopy has proven to be a cost-effective diagnostic tool that increases recognition of suspicious lesions and reduces unnecessary referrals. Evidence shows that its use in primary care can raise diagnostic accuracy for melanoma up to fifteenfold, highlighting its value for family physicians. However, many general practitioners still lack access to structured training. This workshop addresses this gap through hands-on learning focused on practical interpretation and clinical reasoning in daily practice.

Acute mental health presentations are increasingly encountered by general practitioners in both daytime practice and out-of-hours settings. Clinicians must rapidly assess risk, communicate clearly, and make appropriate triage decisions in situations involving intoxication, suicidal ideation, acute psychosis, or behavioural disturbances related to dementia. Acute Behavioural Disturbance (ABD) may also occur, presenting with severe agitation or aggression; management typically begins with verbal de-escalation, with the option of oral or intramuscular (IM) medication such as benzodiazepines when necessary. These scenarios often evolve unpredictably and require a structured yet flexible approach. This workshop uses a “multiverse” concept as an engaging framework to demonstrate how similar presentations can lead to different outcomes depending on early recognition of red flags and chosen management strategies.

However, without structured planning and alignment with population needs, MDTs may inadvertently reinforce inequalities or reduce continuity of care. There is a need for shared learning on how MDTs are organised, how roles are allocated, and which approaches support effective, equitable and sustainable team-based care. A key element of these innovations is the shift of tasks from physicians to non-medical healthcare.

The Drama Triangle is a psychological model of human behaviour describing dysfunctional interactions and roles within relationships or conflict with recurring destructive patterns. It is a subconscious game of power with three primary roles: victim, rescuer and persecutor. Everyone in the triangle is stuck, moving perpetually between all these roles.

Drama triangles are relevant in primary care arising frequently in consultations and team interactions. Research shows that it diminishes performance, wastes time and energy, over-investigation, compassion fatigue, blurred boundaries, co-dependency, negative impact on practice culture and leads to burnout.

Migraine and chronic headache disorders are among the most common and disabling conditions seen in primary care, yet they remain under-recognised, under-treated, and over-referred. My interest in this area stems from my own lived experience of debilitating, treatment-resistant chronic migraines, which affected my personal and professional life. Through this journey, I gained deeper insight into the complexity of headache disorders and the gaps in care that many patients face. During final year of my General Practice Training, I started doing dedicated migraine and chronic headache clinics in my own time free of cost, where I learned that headaches are rarely "just headaches" and often reflect a broader biopsychosocial context. Recent advances, including CGRP-targeted therapies, have significantly changed migraine management and offer new opportunities for effective primary care treatment.

Impact of financialization on patient care in general practice

The financialization of healthcare is the process by which non-healthcare professionals acquire structures that make up the healthcare system. While radiology and laboratory services are currently the most affected sectors in France, primary care is not immune.

This trend challenges the historical balances that underpin primary care delivery. What impact can the pursuit of profitability have on the professional independence of healthcare professionals? How can the quality and appropriateness of care be preserved when financial considerations influence the governance of healthcare facilities? What risks and opportunities does this transformation present for access to care, the attractiveness of regions, and the working conditions of professionals?

To shed light on these questions, this session will bring together committed and recognized experts on the subject. After an introduction focusing on the mechanisms and challenges of financialization in primary care, Doctors Sébastien Adnot and Jean-Paul Hamon will share their firsthand experiences. Drawing on their experience, they will share the changes they have observed in the organization of healthcare services, the consequences for medical practice, and the concerns expressed by professionals. Next, Senator Bernard Jomier, a physician by training and co-author of a recent Senate report on the financialization of healthcare services, will present the findings of the Senate mission. He will discuss the identified challenges, the limitations of the current framework, and the tools available to legislators to better regulate financial investments in the healthcare sector while preserving innovation and the investment capacity of healthcare facilities.

The session will conclude with a question-and-answer session, giving participants the opportunity to share their questions, experiences, and proposals regarding a phenomenon destined to play an increasingly important role in the future of healthcare.

Severe trauma is a major cause of preventable mortality, and a significant proportion of critically injured patients first encounter a family doctor, particularly in rural, semi-urban or community settings. Early assessment using the XABCDE framework—focusing on exsanguinating hemorrhage, airway, breathing, circulation, disability and exposure—is internationally recognised (ATLS, PHTLS, ERC Trauma) as a life-saving priority during the first minutes of care. However, many family doctors report limited training, low confidence and lack of structured tools to approach trauma systematically in low-resource primary care environments. This workshop addresses a core clinical gap by providing a practical and scalable method for early trauma recognition and response.

Redesigning Access Pathways Through Digital Triage: Global Principles for Fair, Efficient and Risk-Managed Primary Care OC EN 436

Across the world, primary care systems are under intense pressure. Demand continues to rise, the workforce is stretched, and traditional “first come, first served” access models create inequity, inefficiency and unmanaged clinical risk. Digital triage offers a structural solution: a way to organise demand safely, prioritise care by urgency, improve equity, and provide a clearer, more predictable experience for patients and clinicians. This workshop introduces universally transferable principles for designing safe, fair and sustainable triage systems—whether digital, hybrid or low-tech. Many countries face the same challenges: long queues, crowded telephone lines, inconsistent triage processes and rising patient frustration. Without structured triage, urgent problems can be missed while non-urgent cases consume capacity. Since 2017, the WHO's Integrated Care for Older People (ICOPE) program has promoted a comprehensive approach to healthy aging. With a strong focus on prevention, it aims to preserve intrinsic capacities (mobility, cognition, nutrition, mood, vision, and hearing) in adults aged 60 years and older. Structured into five steps (screening, comprehensive assessment, personalized care planning, follow-up, and community engagement), ICOPE supports clinically meaningful stratification of frailty and functional limitations. Implemented six years ago in the Occitanie region and currently undergoing national piloting in France, the program places primary care and particularly multidisciplinary primary care practices at the forefront. However, organizational barriers persist, notably in the co-construction of personalized care plans, interprofessional coordination, and longitudinal follow-up.

While the Tdap booster between ages 11 and 14 is most commonly considered, it is important not to forget to review other incomplete or missed vaccinations and to also recommend new vaccinations based on updates to the vaccination schedule.

Embracing complexity: from textbook cases to real-life patients in family medicine WS 467

Clinical practice in family medicine rarely resembles the clear-cut cases found in textbooks or hospital wards. Patients rarely present with a single, isolated problem; instead, they bring intertwined medical, psychological, and social challenges that resist simple solutions. Yet much of the evidence guiding our “best practice” comes from research that deliberately excludes such complexity in pursuit of controlled conditions and singular variables. These gaps between real-life practice and research highlight the need to embrace complexity thinking — an approach that better reflects the realities of everyday care.

Complexity thinking offers practical ways to make sense of the uncertainty and interconnectedness of general practice. In the consultation, it encourages clinicians to look beyond disease management toward understanding relationships, context, and adaptive responses — seeing how small interventions can have large ripple effects across a person’s life. From a research perspective, complexity science reshapes how we design studies in family medicine: valuing context, feedback, and emergence rather than reductionist control. This session will introduce these ideas through clinical and research examples, showing how embracing complexity can enrich care, deepen understanding, and make research more relevant to the realities of primary care.

Healthcare systems contribute substantially to climate change and environmental degradation. Beyond greenhouse gas emissions, pharmaceuticals are a major source of ecotoxic pollution, particularly in aquatic ecosystems, as many active pharmaceutical ingredients persist in the environment, bioaccumulate, or disrupt ecosystems, with long-term consequences for human and planetary health. In primary care, prescribing decisions strongly influence both the carbon footprint of healthcare and the environmental release of pharmaceutical residues. However, ecotoxicity remains largely absent from medical education and clinical guidelines, leaving general practitioners insufficiently equipped to integrate these considerations into routine clinical practice. Innovative educational approaches are therefore needed to translate complex environmental information into clinically relevant and actionable knowledge. We developed a serious game targeting postgraduate physicians and tested it under real-life conditions with early-career general practitioners.

Although palliative care (PC) is often associated primarily with oncology, its scope extends far beyond cancer. PC plays a crucial role in the comprehensive management of patients with serious chronic illnesses, including advanced COPD, severe congestive heart failure (CHF), and progressive dementia. It improves quality of life, assists with complex decision-making, reduces unnecessary interventions, and provides essential support to patients and families. Despite its value, PC training remains limited in many family medicine residency programs. Family physicians, who frequently care for patients with multimorbidity and progressive decline, require practical PC skills to integrate into everyday practice.

**From risk stratification to personalized cancer screening: the role of primary cares**  **Amphitheatre Bordeaux***Session co-organized with the National Cancer Institute (INCa)*

Cancer screening strategies are gradually evolving from an approach primarily based on age to more personalized approaches that take into account individual risk levels. These developments raise numerous questions for primary care, which plays a central role in prevention, identifying at-risk individuals, shared decision-making, and patient support.

Family physicians contribute substantially to contraception and uterine aspiration/D&C care, yet post-training provision varies. A cross-sectional analysis of 21,904 family medicine graduates who completed training during 2008–2018 and currently provided care to xxxx government program beneficiaries found that 61.1% provided prescription contraception, 18.5% provided IUD/implant care, and 0.7% provided D&C in 2019. Graduates from residencies with fully integrated, opt-out family planning curricula, larger program size, and community-based training emphasis had higher odds of providing these services after graduation. Deprescribing (D) is a critical patient safety intervention, particularly for elderly patients where polypharmacy (>10 drugs) significantly increases the risk of adverse events. Beyond individual safety, D aligns with One Health and Planetary Health principles. Reducing unnecessary medication use directly mitigates pharmaceutical pollution in water systems and lowers the carbon footprint associated with global drug manufacturing and distribution. This joint workshop—led by experts from EQUIP, EGPRN, WONCA WP on Quality and Safety, on Research and on Planetary Health and WONCA SIG on non-communicable diseases—applies validated frameworks (e.g., Beers/STOPP-START criteria) to shift the clinical paradigm toward optimizing therapy for both patient and planet.

Burnout affects many healthcare professionals, undermining both quality of care and team well-being. General practitioners play a pivotal role in detecting burnout early and supporting colleagues in distress.
